2017-2018 Executive Director Report

The 2017 year was a year of discovery for both the organization and myself but by the end of the fiscal year we were both ready for the future. It took several months to understand how a non-for-profit can best function in the environment in the province today. Some of the key aspects of operations needed to be evaluated and modified, new processes needed to be introduced and new partnerships and agreements needed to be developed.

The process took approximately 6 months to undertake but now the future for AWES looks much better as will be illustrated in the 2018 future programs section of this annual report. The largest issues to a small organization such as AWES is controlling and managing the expenditure rate in relation to the rate of incoming revenue. This equation was not well managed over the past several years and the expenditures far exceeded the revenue creating some large deficit budgets. The organization expenditures have exceeded the revenue for three out of the past four years which is slowly depleting the reserves and a trend the organization cannot afford to continue any longer. It also had a large built–up liability that had to be addressed which affected the level of un–funded expenses.

These issues have now been addressed and new programs have been developed along with new partnerships for the future that will reverse the past trends and should place AWES on path for sustainable operations in the future. These developments over the past 6 months have led to developing a new organization strategic plan, a new operating plan and marketing strategy to assist in the next 5 years in guiding the organization in its operations. This will assist the Board in moving into a strategic role as desired in the strategic plan. The non-budgeted expenditure of developing a new website which was just recently launched has also re-imaged the organization and will create many opportunities in the future based on the feedback received.

The new programs developed have diversified the AWES operations and programs which will help in stabilizing the revenue and also expanded the client base for the future. New organizations have joined as members of AWES with some more possible new members coming in during the 2018 year. New partnerships have been developed and some of the existing partnerships have been enhanced and expanded

to increase the scale of the AWES programs. One of the new partnerships will place AWES in the world marketplace which should provide for tremendous future opportunities.

All of the above new developments have increase the projected revenue for the organization and the new systems and more diligent approach for financial management will decrease the expenditures. Both of these will assist in projecting a balanced or positive result for the 2018 budget and onward for several years afterward.

Staff Report

FINANCIAL REPORT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2017-2018

I've reviewed the financial material as provided by staff. A summary of the review follows.

1. **Deficit.** AWES incurred a net deficit of \$35,833. To understand the source of this deficit, here is a table presenting the actual revenues received versus actual expenses.

- 2. Paying for the Deficit. AWES began 2017–2018 with unrestricted funds totaling \$67,901. As a result of the 2017–2018 deficit of \$35,833, the amount of unrestricted funding available to AWES for 2018–2019, is \$32,069.
- 3. AWES Unaudited Financial Statements for April 1, 2016 to March 31, 2017. Our review engagement report shows that our financial statements are sound, according to Gil Dubrule, CMA.
- 4. Budget for 2018–2019. Staff will be presenting the AWES 2018–2019 budget at the AGM. The projected budget, shows a net "profit" to AWES, of \$39,556, at the end of the 2018–2019 fiscal year. This is a dramatic turnaround from our 2017–2018 financial situation, and our staff should be congratulated for the work they've done to accomplish this.
- 5. Resignation. I am resigning my post as AWES Director and Treasurer, effective the 2018 AWES AGM. It has been a pleasure working with and getting to know the AWES Directors, Members, and staff in this capacity. I look forward to continue working with AWES in different capacities in the future.

Project Management (2018 – 2021): Projects:

- Battle River Watershed Riparian Restoration: 2018 will be the last year of project with site restoration occurring on two sites and 3-4 grazing plans completed by Cows & Fish. The funding from the EDF fund expires end of September 2018.
- Mighty Peace Watershed Projects: Two projects underway in the Grande Prairie are of the watershed. The Red willow Creek restoration and the Powell Lands restoration projects. The AWES component in 2018 will be the establish a site treatment and a planting prescription for 2019 on both sites. The funding for the two projects is from the AEP WRRP program as administered by the MPWA.
- 2018 Planting Projects: The 2018 program is comprised of two distinct planting projects (the Roth and Junction Lake) and several smaller community or company planting projects. The overall seedling totals this year is 15,000+ seedlings. The funding for these projects varies from landowner, EDF, Forest Ontario and ACA. These are all fee-for-service projects with additional volunteer funding.
- Forest Resource Improvement Association BMP Project: The BMP project is in development phase. The development of the workshop materials has begun with the anticipated completion in mid-summer. The first workshops will be scheduled for the late summer to fall. This year it is anticipated that 3 workshops will be delivered with the remaining 7–9 delivered in spring and summer of 2019. This workshop series could lead to a second workshop that provides the more detailed and hands-on education for managing workshops and forest lands.
- o **Blindman River Restoration Project:** This is a multi-year multi property with two separate sources of funding. The present landowners involved are the initiation point of the work along the river, with the expectations by both funders that up to 5-6 more landowners become part of the project over the next 2-3 years. Presently AEP WRRP is providing public funds and Pur Projet is providing private funds from the Fairmount Hotels (Accor Hotels-worldwide). The project has been approved for site restoration and support work for 31,000+ seedlings but could be expanded to over 50,000+ if enough appropriate lands are brought into the project.
- Williams Project: This is an agroforestry/ecobuffer type of project in central Alberta.
 It is supported by 4 different sources of funding: County, EDF Pur Projet and

landowner contributions. The project is %50 by Pur Projet using funds from both Fairmount Hotels and Clarine Cosmetics. The project will involve planting approximately 6000 seedlings.

Cadieux Site Restoration Project: This project is fully funded by the landowner as it is the regulated responsibility that restoration is undertaken as required by AEP. The site was disturbed and requires restoration work within the next year. The work involved is both restoration work within the floodplain of a Class C stream (being led by a contracted QAES) and planting program in the fall of 2018 and spring of 2019 to restoration the riparian buffer adjacent a Class D stream tributary. This project will be conducted as professional support for the landowner as approved by AEP Operations in Lower Athabasca Region.

• ARECA Environmental Farm Plant (Workbook) Project: This project involves working with ARECA to re-write the Woodlot Chapter of the EFP. This will be undertaken in fall-early winter to provide the enhanced chapter for the new Workbook to be released in the next year. This chapter will become part an environmental section of the workbook, to be released in the future.

Partnership Initiatives Program (2018-2019):

Over the past 6 months AWES has expanded on existing and developed many new working partnerships locally, provincially and internationally The local partnerships are with:

- North Saskatchewan River Watershed Alliance: requested to participate in the NSWA assessment process and sit on review committee for that process. Also, to be available as a site restoration agent in the future for possible work in the watershed.
- Alberta Conservation Association: planting on Junction Lake project in 2018 and assisting ACA in the future possible additional planting and sponsorship funding on other owned lands in Alberta. Provided funding this year for 5300 seedlings from Forest Ontario program.
- Agricultural Research & Extension Council of Alberta: working with ARECA
 to update and enhance the Environmental Farm Plan workbook for
 agricultural producers. This year will be modifying and enhancing the
 Woodlot chapter in the workbook, but also working with ARECA and other
 partners on enhancing the species at risk, biodiversity, and
 wetland/riparian chapter.

• Global Foundation for Social Harmony and Sustainable Development: assisting the Global Foundation in establishing its presence in Alberta and participating in planting event in spring of 2018. Submitted a joint proposal to environment Canada for a future multiyear planting project on lands jointly owned by GF, Ducks Unlimited and private land owner in the Tofield Area.

Provincial ones:

- Red Deer River Watershed Alliance: working with the RDWA on the Blindman restoration project (now dually funded private and public funds) and also in 2018–19 on a watershed assessment process on the Blindman River in manner conducted by the NSWA on the Modeste Creek watershed.
- Mighty Peace River Watershed Alliance: working on several multi year projects in the Grande Prairie area, that will increase in the AWES component in 2018–2020 with the full site restoration work being completed in that time period.
- Forest Resource Improvement Association of Alberta; being funded by FRIAA over the 2018–2020 years to conduct 10–12 workshops on implementation of BMP on private forested landbase. Possible additional project to proposed in the fall of 2018 to be funded by WOLF.
- Woodlands Operations Learning Foundation (WOLF): will provide fee-for-service for WOLF over the next couple years (2018-2020) in delivering workshops and seminars related to forest management on private lands.
 WOLF fund the costs if sessions meets criteria of FRIAA funding.

Out of Province:

- Forest Ontario/Forest Recovery Canada: Funding provided to AWES for three projects in 2018 for a total of 6000+ seedlings being planted and fully funded by their program. Had potential for up to 20,000 seedlings in 2018 and will be striving for that number in 2019.
 Projects are the Honda, Rogers and ACA planting projects.
- Pur Projet (Fairmount Hotel Chain-Accor Hotels): The largest funder and most potential for the future for AWES. They will be funding two projects in 2018 for a total of approximately 11,000 seedings on two projects sites. The Blindman River and Williams Projects are the two sites being funded. The future commitment by Pur Projet and funders (Fairmount-Accor Hotels and Clarins Cosmetics) is for 31,000 plus

seedlings at a variable rate over the 2018–2020 years. This can be increased to over 50,000 if appropriate projects that provide either ecosystem services or agroforestry services are available for funding.

Company/Community Tree Planting (2018–2019)

AWES staff is currently involved in 4 planting projects where AWES is serving as organizer and lead on the project on behalf of a company or community. The projects are fully funded by the party requesting them:

- Honda Company plant in Balzac area
- Rogers Company plant in Balzac area
- Fairmount Hotels Plant in Blackfalds area
- Town of Morinville community plant

These are funded by either Forest Ontario/Forest Recovery Canada, Pur Projet (Fairmount Hotels) or Morinville.

Projects under Development:

- *Global Foundation* (EDF Funding) Development/Improvement of Wildlife Habitat and Carbon Management in central Alberta. Re–establishment of 20–acre parcel of lands jointly owned by Global Foundation, private landowner and Ducks Unlimited to complete planting project in 2019 and 2020. Addition of additional lands in future held by Ducks Unlimited.
- *Bigstone Creek* (EcoAction Funding): Approximately 10 hectares of a total of a 90-hectare parcel of wetland/upland lands desired to be restored by the landowner in the Battle River Watershed. The project involves a site restoration plan to completed in 2019 & 2020. The proposed funding will be comprised of landowner, EDF, Battle River WA and County.
- North Saskatchewan River WA-ALUS
 Support: Agreement between NSWA and AWES to provide site restoration expertise on projects within the Modeste Creek watershed. Assist in delivery of WRRP funding commitment (2018–2021) in identifying and conducting site restoration work in the watershed. Participate in advisory and delivery role.

• *Canada Agriculture Partnership* (WAA & AAForestry Support): The proposal will be submitted to the CAP program with AWES in a support role to assist the WAA and also AA & Forestry in providing services to land owners on woodlot management.
